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long out of print and found only in rare book stores it is now available to a contemporary audience with this new paperback edition when slavery was abolished by the emancipation proclamation there were slaves in every county of the state and almost half the population was directly involved in slavery as either a slave a slaveowner or a member of an owner s family orville taylor traces the growth of slavery from john law s colony in the early eighteenth century through the french and spanish colonial period territorial and statehood days to the beginning of the civil war he describes the various facets of the institution including the slave trade work and overseers health and medical treatment food clothing housing marriage discipline and free blacks and manumission while drawing on unpublished material as appropriate the book is to a great extent based on original often previously unpublished sources valuable to libraries historians in several areas of concentration and the general reader it gives due recognition to the significant place slavery occupied in the life and economy of antebellum arkansas

closely examines on of the supreme court s most infamous decisions that went far beyond one slave s suit for freeman status by declaring that all blacks freemen as well as slaves were not and never could become u s citizens bringing an end to the 1820 missouri compromise while also resulting in the outrage that led to the civil war

this bibliography of 20th century literature focuses on slavery and slave trading from ancient times through the 19th century compiling listings from all western european languages it contains over 10 000 entries the principal sections organize works by political geographical frameworks of the enslavers subject keyword and author indexes provide immediate detailed access to the material

the first edition of bearing witness brought together for the first time 176 slave narratives from the state of arkansas now this new edition adds ten previously undiscovered accounts no one knew the truths of slavery better than the slaves themselves but no one consulted them until the 1930s then recognizing that this generation of unique witnesses would soon be lost to history the works progress administration s federal writers project acted to interview as many former slaves as possible in a continuation of the project s interest in the life histories of ordinary people writers interviewed over two thousand former slaves more than a third of them in arkansas these oral histories were first published in the 1970s in a thirty nine volume series

organized by state and they transformed america s understanding of slavery they have offered crucial evidence on a variety of other topics as well the civil war reconstruction agricultural practices everyday life and oral history itself but some former arkansas slaves were interviewed in texas oklahoma and other states so their narratives were published in those other collections and more than half of the testimonies in the arkansas volume were interviews with people who had moved to arkansas after freedom folklorist george lankford combed all of the state collections for the testimonies properly belonging to arkansas and deleted from this state s collection the testimony of later migrants

the legacy of the slave family haunts the status of black americans in modern u s society stereotypes that first entered the popular imagination in the form of plantation lore have continued to distort the african american social identity in what sorrows labour in my parents breast brenda stevenson provides a long overdue concise history to help the reader understand this vitally important african american institution as it evolved and survived under the extreme opposition that the institution of slavery imposed the themes of this work center on the multifaceted reality of loss recovery resilience and resistance embedded in the desire of african african descended people to experience family life despite their enslavement these themes look back to the critical loss that africans both those taken and those who remained endured as the enslaved poet phillis wheatley honors in the line what sorrows labour in my parents breast and look forward to the generations of slaves born through the civil war era who struggled to realize their humanity in the recreation of family ties that tied them through blood and emotion to a reality beyond their legal bondage to masters and mistresses stevenson pays particular attention to the ways in which gender generation location slave labor the economic status of slaveholders and slave societies laws affected the black family in slavery

in the first book length study of arkansas slavery in more than sixty years a weary land offers a glimpse of enslaved life on the south s western margins focusing on the intersections of land use and agriculture within the daily life and work of bonded black arkansans as they cleared trees cultivated crops and tended livestock on the southern frontier arkansas s enslaved farmers connected culture and nature creating their own meanings of space place and freedom kelly houston jones analyzes how the arrival of enslaved men and women as an imprisoned workforce changed the meaning of arkansas s acreage while their labor transformed its landscape they made the most of their surroundings despite the brutality and increasing labor demands of the second slavery the increasingly harsh phase of american chattel bondage fueled by cotton cultivation in the old southwest jones contends that enslaved arkansans were able to repurpose their experiences with agricultural labor rural life and the natural world to craft a sense of freedom rooted in the ability to own land the power to control their own movement and the right to use the landscape as they saw fit
